In 2023, the Kansas City Royals baseball team had an estimated net worth of \$1.2B. This represented a nine percent increase over the net worth in 2022. The operating income of the Royals in 2023 was \$33M.



Royals' owner John Sherman has a net worth of 1.25B. His salary is \$100M a year.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

General Description

Kauffman Stadium is located at One Royal Way in Kansas City, Missouri. The renovation, completed in 2010, was intended to enhance the fan's game day experience, increase revenue generation, and improve the day-to-day operations of the Kansas City Royals and other users of the facility. The stadium holds approximately 38,000 fans and offers amenities such as an outfield concourse, kids' area, bars, restaurants, hall of fame/conference center, and various other spaces geared towards large scale entertainment.

General Condition

In general, Kauffman Stadium and the immediate environs were observed to be in satisfactory condition. It is apparent the Kansas City Royals have performed the ordinary cleaning and maintenance obligations consistent with a First-Class MLB Baseball Stadium.

Minor physical deficiencies were observed throughout various locations within Kauffman Stadium and the immediate environs. Such deficiencies are expected in such a large facility and typical of a high-use facility. Most deficiencies can be easily addressed by the Kansas City Royals through standard maintenance procedures.

Recommendations

The final section of this document, labeled "Summary of Recommendations" includes recommendations for the deficiencies observed for each building or site category. Most observed deficiencies are generally minor and may require attention in a timely manner. Critical, more hazardous issues are less frequent, and the level of importance has been noted in the document to reflect the need for a resolution.

KC Royals Response Plan

The Kansas City Royals have developed a response plan to rectify the deficiencies observed by Burns & McDonnell this year. This plan includes the location of each deficiency, an action to correct or maintain the item of concern, and a date for which each item is to be addressed. This report can be found as "Exhibit A" attached to the end of this document.



Few persons live close the new stadium site, but they have high incomes. The farther out from the stadium you go, the lower the incomes.



"We want people to walk...."

Earl Santee, CEO of Populous, the design firm the team hired at the Royal's press conference on 2/13/24 at 18:50 in the video. "We want people to enjoy the city from a pedestrian viewpoint rather than from a car going 50 or 60 miles per hour."



The available parking that Earl Santee, CEO of Populous, the group that is advising the Royals on the design and location of the new stadium, says 40,000 parking spaces are available in the "greater downtown area." This compares with 26,000 in the Kauffman parking lot.

I cannot verify where the parking spot counts come from. I don't have data to support it.

The blue areas are the lots he is talking about. Some of these extend beyond a mile from the proposed site.

Will walking from my car to my seat take longer than at Kauffman?

There are 4,100 spaces of surface parking, 3,700 spaces of structured parking and 1,200 spaces of on-street parking, totaling 9,000 spots within a 10-minute walk of the proposed stadium site.

More spots are available in a wider radius that would mean a 15- or 20-minute walk to the stadium, according to Santee. "The beauty is at the Crossroads site we can park all 9,000 people here that we need to park," Santee said. "We're not building new parking for this 9,000. And all within a 10-minute walk out of the ballpark."

The proposed stadium would be <u>able to seat 35,000 fans</u>.

As voters decide whether they want their tax dollars to help pay for a new Royals stadium in the East Crossroads neighborhood near downtown, the issue of parking continues to come into question. Mainly — will there really be enough of it?

The Royals have said there will be plenty of space for fans, citing 40,000 parking spots in the "greater downtown area" within a 20-minute walk of the ballpark, compared to 26,000 at Kauffman Stadium.

But only 9,000 existing, multiuse spots are within a 10-minute walk of the new stadium, according to the numbers shared at the Royals press conference announcing the site. The team said that's the required number of spots it would need for its 35,000-person stadium.

How did the team arrive at that number? Would it still be enough when concerts or other events coincide with game days? Here's what we've learned so far.

How did the Royals decide they need 9,000 parking spots for games?

At February's press conference, the team highlighted that 9,000 parking spots were within a 10-minute walk of the proposed site.

"The beauty is at the Crossroads site we can park all 9,000 people here that we need to park," said Earl Santee, CEO of Populous, the design firm the team hired. "We're not building new parking for this 9,000. And all within a 10-minute walk out of the ballpark."

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — A new report from Safe Wise ranks Kansas City as the fifth most dangerous big city in the country.

According to its **methodology**, Safe Wise said Kansas City is the country's fifth most dangerous big city behind St. Louis, Detroit, Baltimore and Memphis. Milwaukee, Cleveland, Albuquerque, Indianapolis and Oakland round out the top 10.

The safest big cities in the country were Virginia Beach, Virginia; Honolulu; Lexington, Kentucky; San Diego; El Paso, Texas; San Jose, California; Austin; Mesa, Arizona; and Tampa.

Safe Wise analyzed FBI crime report statistics and population data for 2017 for cities with populations than 300,000. Cities were ranked based on the number of reported violent crimes – aggravated assault, murder, rape and robbery – in each city. If there was a tie, Safe Wise also factored in the number of property crimes (burglary, arson, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle thefts). To level the playing field, Safe Wise calculated the rate of crimes per 1,000 people in each city.

In Missouri, Platte City is the only metro area city to rank in the **top 20 safest cities in the Show Me State**. Overall, the Show-Me State has fewer than one violent crime incident per 1,000 people. That's nearly four fewer incidents than the national violent crime rate of 4.49, Safe Wise said.

Fairway, Basehor, Leawood, Louisburg, Lenexa, Shawnee and Olathe rank in the **top 20 for Kansas**, with Fairway, Basehor and Leawood ranking in the top five. The 20 safest cities in Kansas are all well below both state and national violent crime rates, with each reporting under two violent crime incidents per 1,000 people.



Note on KCPD Data:

If you have 5 people involved in a robbery, for example, there would be five separate data entries for each person even though it was only one incident. Suppose in a single incident, the police are called to an aggravated assault, but when they show up, they find drugs and destruction of property and three persons. That one incident would be reported as nine records in the database.









The Padres' stadium in San Diego is in a relatively safe downtown area.




The area around Camden Yards has had its issue with crime, including the murder of Timothy Reynolds, less than a half mile away from the ballpark.

"This year, two shootings, carjackings and robberies have happened within a mile-and-a-half radius. In 2022, a man was shot and killed two miles from the ballpark. And in 2019 a man shot a woman multiple times three miles away.

Economist Anirban Basu says crimes in the area, may be a direct impact on lagging ticket sales for the Orioles. "A lot of people have become accustomed to not going to downtown Baltimore.," said Basu."



In 1999, the Boston Red Sox proposed building a 'New Fenway' Park'¹. However, instead of building a completely new stadium, Fenway Park underwent a series of improvements. For instance, eight new private suites replaced the six temporary boxes that were placed on the pavilion for the 1999 All-Star Game. Additionally, 12 other private suites were renovated. The Coca-Cola Corner, featuring 412 new seats with familyfriendly seating and hospitality, was also unveiled in left field². As for Earl Santee, a principal at HOK Sport (now known as Populous), he was involved in the design of the new Yankee Stadium³. His work aimed to combine modern elements with tradition, replicating design characteristics of the original structure while adding new features³. However, I couldn't find specific information about Santee's involvement in the 1999 Fenway Park remodel.
